We are proud to share with you our 2019-2020 Annual Report. As you page through this publication, you'll find a record of the generosity of our community and the collective educational impact they had on students here at WASD.

Despite the 2019-2020 school year being what it was in the face of a global pandemic, WASDEF experienced one of its strongest years in terms of revenue generation, thanks, in part, to the loyalty of our donors, and community and business partnerships. Through a collective effort, we were fortunate to raise \$424,179 in pledges and donations from among more than 450 donors. As we move forward, we will continue to work closely with WASD to ensure these generous contributions are used to enhance the excellent educational programs and provide innovative opportunities for students.

With that, however, it should be noted that WASDEF wasn't entirely immune to the operational and economic challenges the COVID-19 pandemic dealt to nearly every industry. An abbreviated school year prevented the realization of funded programs, eliminating a number of impactful learning opportunities and experiences for students. Additionally, a turbulent market affected our ability to administer scholarships from 21 funds — slashing the amount we typically grant to graduating seniors by nearly half.

2020 was arguably one of the most challenging years to navigate in recent memory for nonprofit organizations. While the uncertainty remains as we face the future, we're hopeful that supporters like you will continue to be mindful of the educational needs of those who *are* our future right here at WASD.

As always, we thank you for being our champions of education.

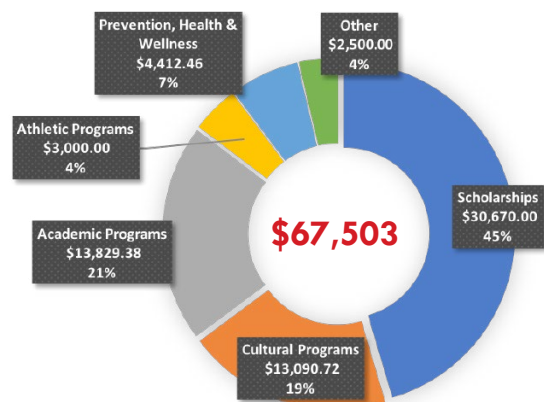

otherwise have gotten to experience.

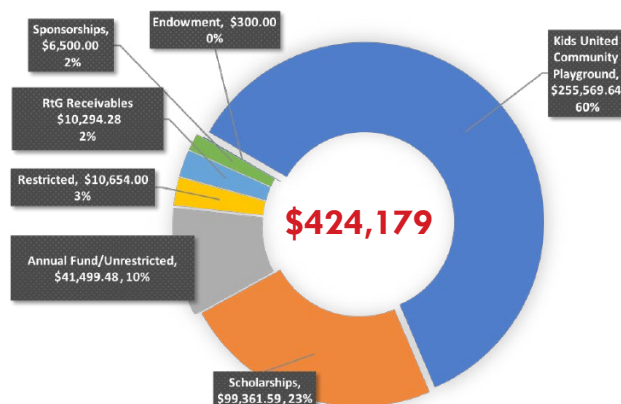

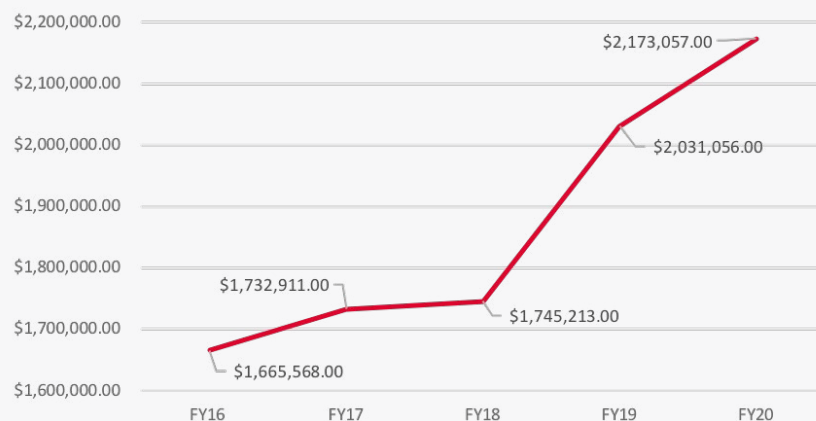

Grants Support Creation of **New Elective, Piano Lab at WAHS** to Broaden Student Reach

A **\$10,381** grant from WASDEF's Violet Compton Estate Fund supported a new, innovative music elective that allows students to make music outside of performing ensembles.

The new WAHS Piano Lab opened to all students at the high school in grades nine through 12 in the fall of 2019 to learn the basics of piano keyboarding and composition. Using piano techniques, students can play and create music of their own over the course of a semester, year or over many years, as the elective can be taken multiple times.

The lab also was supported by a \$10,817 grant from the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania through Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) donations received from the

First National Bank of PA, Highmark Insurance Group and Woodlands Bank. An in-kind contribution also was made by Robert M. Sides Family Music Centers.

Combined, the grants supported the installation of 16 pianos, a teacher piano, headphones, controllers, an expansion kit and professional training.

While the initial implementation of the grant focused on keyboarding, the lab will have the potential to grow into a composition and recording studio.

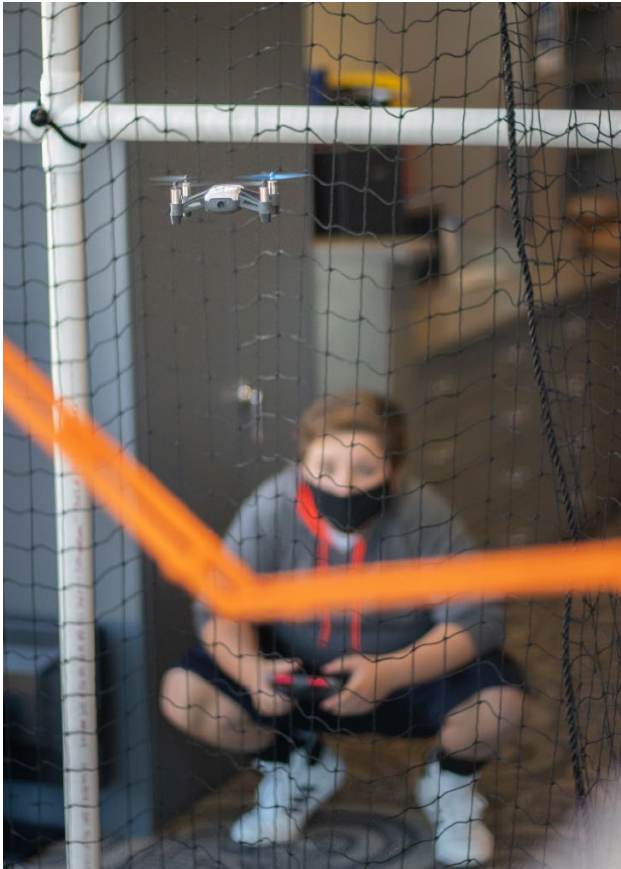
Ultimately, younger students who enroll in the new elective in future years will already have familiarity with digitally composing and mixing music. In 2018-



2019, WASDEF funded two recording studios and a new digital music curriculum at the intermediate school level.

The Violet Compton Estate Fund was established as a bequest to WASDEF shortly after Compton's death in 2007, designated for music education.

Ms. Compton's memory has lived on through the fund, which has, in recent years, provided more than \$30,000 of support to the music program.



Grant Supports **New Virtual and Augmented Reality Curriculum** at WAMS

A **\$2,875** grant helped to support a new addition to the FutureLab at WAMS.

Funding from WASDEF provided for the launch of a new virtual and augmented reality curriculum for seventh- and eighth-grade students. The grant was used to purchase VR headsets, a 360-degree camera and accessories, drone kits and a drone arena (shown at left).

Nearly 800 students each year will now benefit from getting an early, hands-on experience in working with emerging technology that's beginning to surface across a wide range of career industries.

Grants Support Program Enhancements

Each year, WASDEF accepts grant requests on a rolling deadline to help support program enhancements or needs as they surface.

During the 2019-2020 school year, four grants, totaling **\$4,203**, were approved through either the foundation's Teacher Mini-Grant program or through its general funding request process.

Educator-in-Residence: Brittany McLaughlin

A **\$1,000** grant allowed for local artist and alumnus **Brittany McLaughlin '92** to return to WAHS in January to lead a weaving workshop as part of a month-long unit with Andrea McDonough Varner's Mindful Art students. The students were able to experience more in-depth techniques and processes in weaving by using and preparing the art suite's four-harness loom. *(Photos at right were taken during McLaughlin's visit.)*

Unified Arts Gallery at WAMS

A **\$1,410** grant supported the installation of a Unified Arts Gallery at WAMS. Located in the hallway leading to the cafeteria/auditorium, the space will serve as a venue to display artwork done by students, including, but not limited to, display cases and television screens to run slideshows and video clips taken at events. It also will feature permanently framed student artwork.

Master Class with Musician Alexander Hersh

Facilitated by the Williamsport Music Club, a **\$300** grant funded an opportunity for WAHS orchestra students to experience a master class in October with international cellist Alexander Hersh.

Millionaire Career Closet at WAHS

A **\$1,493** grant supported the creation of the Millionaire Career Closet at WAHS. The program is designed to collect clothing to help students in need for interviews for potential employment. The Career Closet is designed for any student who needs business casual or business formal attire so that he or she can be appropriately dressed for not just interviews but also club competitions, athletic events or other school-related functions.



Funding Helps Streamline Athletic Registrations



A **\$3,000** grant to the WASD athletic department helped to better streamline the registration process for student-athlete families.

The grant supported the subscription fee and document uploads to PlantHS, an online platform that warehouses information for high school athletes that eliminates the need for multiple registrations in a single year.

"This online platform allows families to enter their information one time into the system and generate the specific PIAA paperwork that we need for their student to participate in athletics at WASD," said Athletic Director Sean McCann.

'Be Present': WASDEF Supports Attendance Campaign

WASD announced the launch of its "Be Present" campaign, a school district-community call-to-action to promote the importance of being in school every day while also raising awareness against chronic absenteeism.

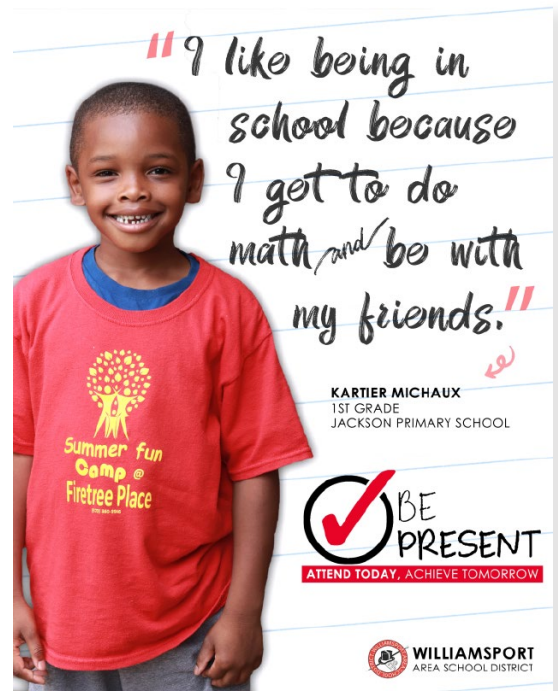
The district took the local lead with its own campaign, designed according to the framework set forth by Attendance Works.

WASDEF provided a **\$1,500** grant to the effort to help offset the cost of marketing materials needed to promote the campaign in schools.

The "Be Present" campaign will more pervasively bring attention to the cause with a goal of mobilizing the community to promote the value of good attendance and reduce chronic absences.

The Williamsport Sun-Gazette, Webb Weekly and Lamar Advertising also signed on as media sponsors to push out the message during national Attendance Awareness Month in September using promotional materials that display the faces of WASD students.

"Too many absences not only can affect achievement but also the social and emotional growth of the student," said Dr. Richard Poole, director of student services. "When families understand the negative effects of chronic absenteeism on realizing their hopes and dreams for their children, we can work on improving attendance in WASD."



COVID-19 Response: Grant Supports Free Meal Program



When the COVID-19 pandemic shut down schools on March 13, the district's food service department — and our business community — stepped up to help ensure our students continued to have access to food.

From March 17 through June 5, the district operated a free meal assistance program Monday through Friday, staffed by members of the district's food service department.

In that three-month span, a total of **37,404 meals** were distributed. The program provided free bagged meals at several school-based locations, which included items for both breakfast and lunch, to students in need.

In addition to support the district received from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Wegmans and the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank, WASDEF received **\$1,344** from The GIANT Co. in support of the free meal program.

Funding Futures

\$30,670 was awarded among 110 scholarships, awards and prizes to 69 members of the Class of 2020 to help support their future plans.

Alumnus Endows Scholarship Fund in Family's Name

Williamsport native and WAHS graduate **Jim Sullivan '70** and his older brother were the first in their family to attend college. The value of the education Jim received at the University of Colorado was passed on to his children, now graduates of the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

To continue supporting future generations in their pursuit of higher education, Jim and his wife, Annette, endowed the Jim Sullivan and Family Scholarship Fund. Funds generated from the endowment will be used to support a WAHS grad who is the first member of their family to attend a college or university, and commits to participating in a free online mentorship program.

"Families are usually positively transformed when a high school graduate pursues higher education," Jim said, "but the majority of first-generation college students drop out by sophomore year due to a lack of direction, support and mentorship."

The added requirement will help students navigate the unfamiliar collegiate processes and challenges.

Now a resident of Appleton, Wisconsin, Jim is the CEO and founder of Sullivision.com, a food service and retail industry resource for results-driven training tools and programs. His clients include Walt Disney, McDonald's, American Express, Panera Bread, and Starbucks.

"The Sullivan family hopes that by establishing this scholarship, we will help deserving Williamsport students and families improve both their future and our communities," Jim said. "Go Millionaires!"

The scholarship will be awarded for the first time in 2021.

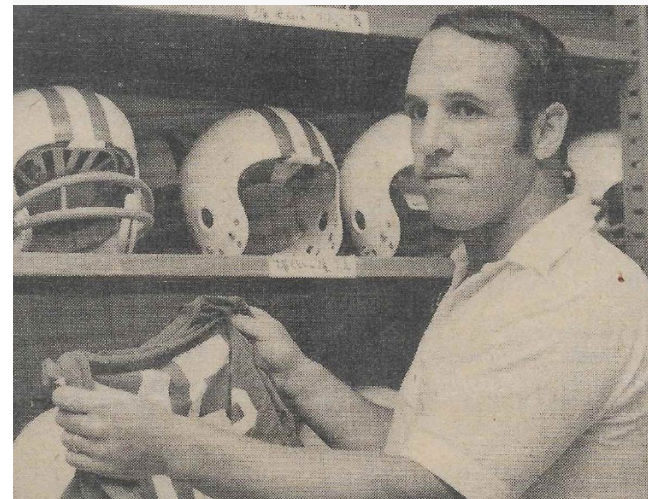

Memorial Scholarship Named for Tim Montgomery

A new scholarship fund was created in the fall of 2019 in memory of Tim Montgomery, WAHS's winningest coach.

The Tim Montgomery Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by his family to memorialize the health and physical education teacher who taught at WAHS and coached the Millionaire football team for more than 25 years.

He passed away at the age of 74 on Aug. 15, 2019, after a long battle with cancer.

Montgomery came to WAHS in 1977 from Shamokin. It was a move that laid the foundation for a storied career and one that earned him a spot in the Pennsylvania Scholastic Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2003 as the winningest coach in WAHS's 120-year history. His coaching career at WAHS amassed a record of 165 wins, 93 losses and three ties.

He retired in 2001.

"As a dedicated (teacher) and head football coach, he exemplified the hard work, discipline and honor he taught to his students and athletes," his family stated. "Coach Montgomery's family, friends, students and players would like to establish this scholarship in his memory to carry on his legacy."

Future recipients of the scholarship must be a "football player of outstanding character who plans to continue his education and who displays qualities that Coach Montgomery valued. The recipient should demonstrate integrity and hard work, both in the classroom and on the field."

The scholarship will be awarded for the first time in 2021.

Partnerships in Action: All-Inclusive Playground Closer to Becoming Reality

The Kids United Community Playground is a collaborative community project formed out of a joint partnership between the Williamsport Kiwanis Club, Williamsport Rotary Club and WASDEF, which serves as the fiscal agent in the project.

While by June 30 the effort surpassed its \$400,000 goal by more than \$20,000, the pandemic brought the effort to a standstill last spring. Using the additional time, the committee is working to expand the poured rubber flooring surface so

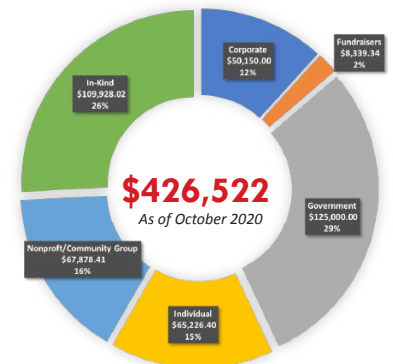
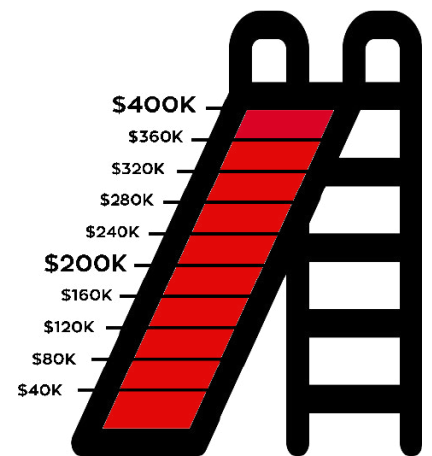

that it covers the entire footprint of the play area for increased security and accessibility measures.

Over the course of the 2019-2020 school year, 65 donors and funders collectively contributed \$255,569 to the project.

The playground, with installation planned to begin in June 2021, will feature equipment that contributes to the five elements of inclusive play. It will include accessible ramps for wheelchairs and other assistive devices. It also will have traditional equipment and structures that encourage imaginative and cognitive play, fitness and instrumental activities.

Collaborative Effort Raises Funds for **BackPack Program**

District students benefited from a casual Friday last October through a first-of-its-kind, community-wide event.

WASDEF and the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank joined forces for the first “Dress Down for Williamsport Schools Day” in an effort to raise funds in support of the district-wide Hybrid BackPack Program.

The program not only provides a weekend’s worth of free meals to food-insecure students through the school year, it also allows students to access food during school time as needed.

The premise of the effort was that individuals and businesses could buy a \$30 T-shirt, emblazoned with “This Shirt Feeds a Future,” to wear on Friday, Oct. 18, to display their support of the program.

Between the more than 160 T-shirts sold and gifts made to support the program, **\$6,810** was raised.

The program launched district-wide in 2018, thanks to a \$200,000 grant the food bank received from the Williamsport-Lycoming Community and the Charles A. Szybist and Carla G. Szybist funds at the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania.

Grant funds expired at the end of the 2019-2020 academic year. Since then, WASDEF and the food bank have continued their partnership to develop ways to sustain the program.

On average, about 3,200 students were supplied with food through this program per year over the life of the grant.



Annual Holiday Essay Contest Celebrates Writing Success

Since 2011, kindergarten through fifth-grade students have annually had the opportunity to use their writing skills to earn an experience on The Santa Express through WASDEF’s collaborative Holiday Essay Contest with the Williamsport/Lycoming Chamber of Commerce.

But in 2019, the education foundation, along with the district’s Title I program, went “off the rails” to partner with River Valley Transit so that the contest’s 25 winners could receive an exclusive ride on the trolley for their own holiday Tour of Lights. Following the tour, the students also enjoyed an exclusive story time session with cookies and hot chocolate, provided and served by students from WAHS’s culinary arts program, in the rotunda at the James V. Brown Library.

The 2019 Holiday Essay Contest had students respond to, in 200 words or less: “What are you most thankful for during the holiday season and why?”

Over the Edge

In collaboration with the River Valley Regional YMCA and YWCA Northcentral PA, the WASD Education Foundation once again participated in the Over the Edge (OTE) event for the second time on Oct. 26.

The event allowed members of the community to voluntarily commit to raise at least \$1,000 for the nonprofit of their choice — or have it divided evenly among all three — in a daring exchange to rappel from the top of the Lycoming County Housing Authority’s William Hepburn High Rise Apartments downtown.

WASDEF raised **\$10,835** during the event.

Together, the nonprofits collectively generated more than \$100,000 for their respective organizations through the efforts of about 70 “edgers” and sponsors.



Raise the Region

WASDEF once again participated in Raise the Region, the annual 30-hour online fundraising event hosted by the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania.

This year’s Raise the Region event was held on March 11 and 12.

Thanks to 27 donors, WASDEF raised \$4,591.

Since it began in 2013, WASDEF has generated more than \$54,000 through the event.

Gifts made during this event help to support enhancements to the district’s academic, athletic and cultural programs. In years past, funds generated through this event have supported efforts, such as renovations to STA Stadium, counseling programs, and STEM enhancements across the district.





Primary Sources: Funding Educators-in-Residence

Using EITC funds, William Kamkwamba, author of the *New York Times* best-selling memoir, *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind*, visited with Dustin Brouse's students in the Williamsport Area Middle School's FutureLab on Sept. 26, 2019.

Kamkwamba's memoir, which served as the basis for the 2019 Netflix drama by the same name, recounts the Malawian native's work and ingenuity to build a windmill from scrap that brought electricity and water to his village when he was just 14 years old.

The author's visit culminated a month-long unit on exploring energy. Funds supported the purchase of two classroom sets of the young adult version of Kamkwamba's book, which allowed students to gain a global perspective on the importance of innovation and inventiveness as it pertains to STEM education and energy production.

Funds also made the purchase of KidWind software and equipment possible (shown below) that gave students first-hand experience in designing and engineering their own windmills.



Educational Improvement Tax Credit Program at WASD

The Pennsylvania Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Program is administered by the state Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) under Act 48. Established in 2001, the program awards tax credits to businesses that make contributions to scholarship organizations and/or educational improvement organizations that are on a list approved and published by DCED.

The WASD Education Foundation actively pursues EITC dollars from approved businesses and identifies eligible programs for funding on behalf of the school district. EITC funds for WASD are held at and administered by the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania (FCFP).

Since 2009, FCFP has granted more than \$191,000 to WASD for venture or educator-in-residence programs.

How do you direct your company's tax dollars to benefit WASD?

Apply to participate for one or two years to DCED. The tax credit is a 75-percent credit (against taxes owed). However, if a company provides a written two-year commitment of equal funding, the credit becomes 90 percent.

Once approved, EITC contributions can be directed to benefit the district through the program at FCFP.

More than 100 guests attended the second annual event to witness the cohort of Distinguished Alumni formally accept their honor.

Keynote speaker William Kamkwamba, author of the New York Times best-selling memoir, *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind*, spoke on his work and ingenuity to build a windmill from scrap

that brought electricity and water to his Malawian village when he was just 14 years old.

He shared his story of growing up in Malawi and his drive to bring change to his suffering community and his current work to build an innovation center for Malawian youth.

Executive Director Greg Hayes opened the ceremony, reviewing some of the foundation's 2018-2019 highlights.

Hayes reported the education foundation granted \$125,000 to the school district last school year and generated more than \$339,000 in revenue, a 43-percent increase over the previous year.



"Donors came forward to help us establish three new funds, bringing our total funds under management to 149," Hayes said, "allowing our total asset value to surpass the \$2 million mark for the first time. 


