WASD Education Foundation Holds 1st 'Cherry & White Appreciation Night': A Night of Celebration, Inspiration

Held at Lycoming College's Trachte Music Center on Sept. 21, the evening, dedicated to WASD educators, was marked by the induction of this year's WAHS Distinguished Alumni and a presentation by keynote speaker Michael Bonner.

On behalf of the education foundation board of directors, I want to express our appreciation to the educators in this room and for recognizing us as a vehicle by which to help enhance the educational experience," said WASDEF Executive Director Greg Hayes.

Hayes reported the education foundation provided \$172,000 in grant support to district programs and scholarships in the 2022-2023 school year, benefiting an estimated 4,100 students. Additionally, it received nearly \$215,000 in contributions from more than 400 donors.

Over the past five years, Hayes added, WASDEF has granted nearly \$1.2 million to programs and scholarships, while also securing about \$1.7 million in donations.

"These numbers embody more than just the data displayed on the screen behind me," Hayes said. "They symbolize the driving force that brought to life programs, expanded access or created opportunities, and they represent

your colleagues' vision for an enhanced learning experience and passion for the work you do. Your dedication shapes the lives of thousands of graduates who go on to achieve remarkable success, like the individuals we're about to honor."

WASDEF President Dr. Brooke Beiter presented this year's Distinguished Alumni: Alan Eck '87, Ruth Perry Hodge '54, Jerah Reeves '16, and Mary Sieminski '61.

Eck received the Distinguished Alumni Achievement Award. Excelling in the field of accounting before retiring as the senior tax manager for a prominent \$5 billion construction company, he has made a name for himself as an NFL football officiator, earning significant recognition in the sports world.

Throughout her career, Hodge, who received the Distinguished Alumni Humanitarian Award, dedicated herself to public service, working at the US Army War College and the US Army Military History Institute. She also played a

crucial role in preserving and celebrating the contributions of African Americans during World War II.

Reeves received the Distinguished Young Alumnus Award for his significant impact in the field of leadership development, particularly in higher education, by pioneering the Transformational Leaders Program and founding Level Up Gen-Z, an information and technology company focused on empowering young people.

Sieminski received the Distinguished Alumni Service Award for being a passionate advocate for women's rights and for playing



WAHS SENIOR WINS PRESTIGIOUS RENSSELAER MEDAL AWARD

Already named a Commended Student in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program, WAHS senior **Sam Radulski** was selected to receive the Rensselaer Medal Award, a scholarship opportunity worth \$160,000.

If he opts to attend Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (RPI), based in Troy, NY, next fall, Radulski will be guaranteed to receive the merit scholarship at a value of \$40,000 per year for four years.

The Rensselaer Medal Award, first presented in 1916, holds two purposes: to recognize the superlative academic achievement of young men and women, and to motivate students toward careers in science, engineering and technology, according to the institute.

"I'm honored to receive this award,"
Radulski said. "I'd like to thank all of my
teachers, particularly those in the math and
science departments — and especially my
parents — for helping me get this far."

The son of Steve and Stephanie Radulski, he was also recently named a Commended Student in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program.

Speaking on behalf of the math and science departments, who nominated Radulski for the award, WAHS science teacher Andrew Paulhamus said, "Sam represents the very best of what it means to be a Williamsport Millionaire. He has excelled as an athlete, artist, musician and scholar during his time at WAHS. The math and science departments are incredibly proud of Sam and felt his efforts and achievements in these areas were worthy of recognition."

While he has yet to commit to where he'll attend next fall, RPI is among his top four choices. Wherever he chooses, he aspires to pursue a degree in engineering or engineering technology.

For the 4th Time, PAEA Names WASD a '2023 Outstanding Visual Arts Community'

WASD has been recognized as a 2023 Outstanding Visual Arts Community from the Pennsylvania Art Education Association (PAEA) for its commitment to visual arts education.

his is the fourth time the district has received the designation since 2019.

Districts that receive the endorsement demonstrate the importance of their visual arts programs by meeting the following criteria:

- Rigorous and inclusive programs: Arts programs demonstrate rigor using standards-based curriculum taught at every level by highly qualified and certified arts educators.
- Highly accessible programs: Art programs are offered to all students at every level of education with a sustainable budget for the visual arts.
- Highly visible programs: Schools and districts identify their programmatic accomplishments, curriculum for all levels, art staff, mission statements, and arts events using their school websites and social media.

"Being recognized, once again, as an Outstanding Visual Arts Community is a testament to the love and dedication that our team of artist educators pours into their work each day," said Dr. Andrea McDonough, the district's K-12 art department coordinator. "From the abundance of smiles that fill the primary

art classrooms to the determined focus of our college-bound senior artists in the high school studio spaces, it's clear that we have something special here at WASD."

Schools providing these opportunities equip students with visual literacy, according to PAEA. Visual literacy constitutes the new thinking and learning skills of a digital age and a creative economy. These are the types of cognitive skills young people will need to find their place in a globally competitive workforce.

The U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reports that the arts and culture sector is a \$699 billion industry, which represents 4.3 percent of the nation's gross domestic product. Technology innovations such as big data, data analytics, and visualization will simply increase the importance of visual and spatial learning skills.

"We're incredibly proud of our teachers and this accomplishment," said Kristin Takach, secondary curriculum and K-12 unified arts supervisor. "Our students benefit from the art curriculum as well as the endeavor of being creative across all academic areas. We're grateful and fortunate to have such a talented group of dedicated art educators."





HIGH INDUSTRIES MAKES \$10,000 EITC CONTRIBUTION TO WAHS WELDING PROGRAM

High Industries Inc. recently made a \$10,000 contribution in support of WAHS's welding program.

The donation was made through the state's Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Program via the First Community Foundation Partnership of Pennsylvania (FCFP).

"We are very grateful for our relationship with High Industries and for their generous contribution to our programming," said Matt Fisher, director of the high school's Career and Technical Education (CTE) Program. "These funds will provide our students with enhanced resources and invaluable hands-on experiences to help prepare them for thriving careers in the welding industry."

Welding is one of the 15 workforce development courses made available to WAHS students through the high school's CTE program.

Created by the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development, the EITC program allows companies to reinvest dollars directly back to local communities. It provides tax credits to eligible companies that do business in the state when they contribute to scholarship organizations, educational improvement organizations and/or prekindergarten scholarship organizations. Businesses that donate through the program may receive a tax credit equal to 75 percent of its contribution or 90 percent for a two-year commitment.

EITC funds for WASD are held at and administered by FCFP.

Last school year, FCFP received more than \$50,000 in EITC contributions designated for WASD in a combination of funds received from C&N, First National Bank, High Industries Inc., M&T Bank, UPMC Health Plan and Woodlands Bank.

"Each year, the event surpassed our expectations, and each year, it's been hugely successful," Hayes said, adding that the average audience attendance over the five-year span was about 1,700 people. "We make every attempt to bring back this event with as much impact as possible. We are very grateful for our sponsors who have stepped up to help make that happen, particularly to Geisinger, who has returned as our presenting sponsor this year."


